A number of our students have become obsessed with the latest online craze Fortnite. We encourage students sharing their interests and making connections with each other beyond school hours. However, I do have a problem when these interests and connections impact on their friendships and learning. Unfortunately a number of our younger students have engaged



with Fortnite. This is having a negative impact on their social play and learning. For our whānau who are not sure what I am talking about Fortnite is an online game. The aim of the game is to defeat other players by fighting them. As Fortnite is an online game you will play against players of different ages from across the world. You **cannot** turn this communication

off or choose who you play against.

Fortnite has a <u>PEGI rating of 12</u>, PEGI have said this is due to the: 'frequent scenes of mild violence. It is not suitable for persons under 12 years of age'. It is important to note this PEGI rating only takes into account the content in the game and not the contact element, where players may be exposed to swearing and offensive language from strangers in voice or on-screen text chat. These on screen chats cannot be blocked.

Please whānau be aware of what online activity your child has and help them to be safe on online. The PECI ratings are there for a reason. Have an open and honest conversation with your child. It's important to involve yourself in your child's online life and a simple and effective way to do this is by talking to them about their life online. Try to maintain an open dialogue with your child and find opportunities to talk to them about what they love to do online. Help your child access the amazing resources the internet has to offer whilst keeping them safe online at the same time. Asking your child about how they play Fortnite and what they like about it is a great way to start a conversation. Play with them. It may seem daunting, but one of the best things that you can do is to engage with the gaming environment and begin to understand what makes Fortnite so attractive to young people, as well as giving yourself an idea of the reporting tools available within the game. Know how to make a report. On Fortnite you can report players who are behaving inappropriately by using the in-game feedback tool located in the game Main Menu, you can also make a report by emailing the creators of Fortnite.
