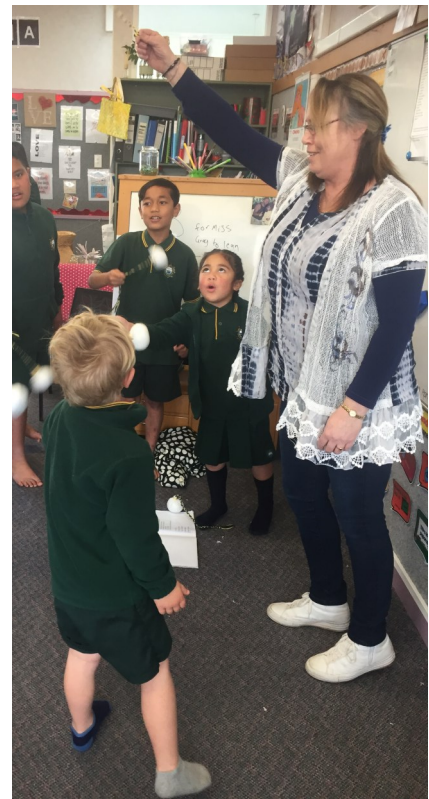
Te Wiki o te Reo Māori 10th –14th Mahuru

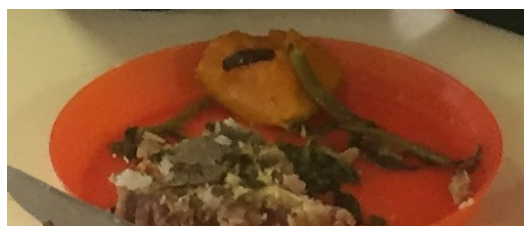

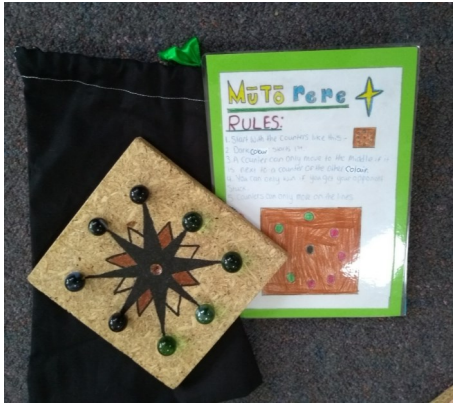

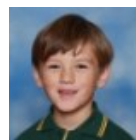

Mahaki Chambers for his consistent management of self and wonderful application of 'endeavour' in all aspects of his learning at school.



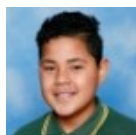

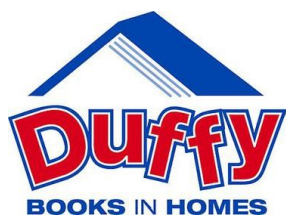
Highland Dancing Success
