AROUND THE SCHOOL

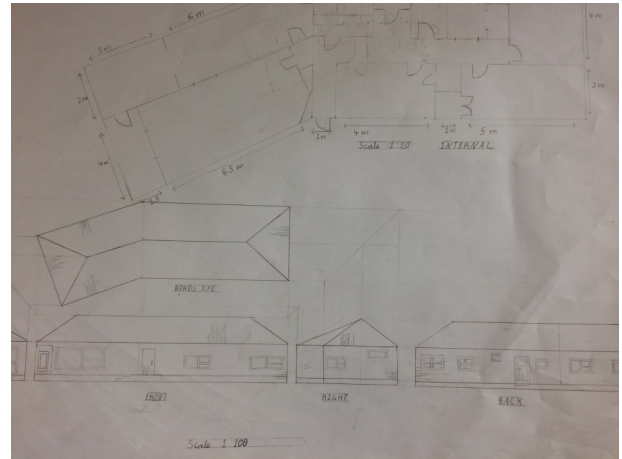
Learning in a real world context.

For this week of learning in Room 1 we have been drawing our houses. First we started with our front, left side, right side, back and birds eye view. We then added the internal view of our houses with all the main measurements.

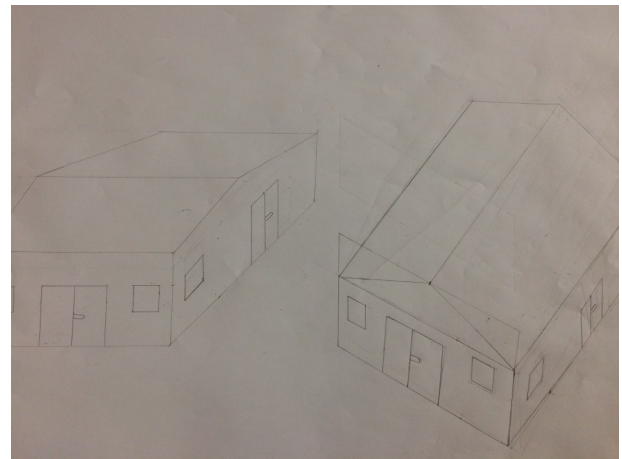
We also had to use a scale to make our house fit well. Once we had finished that, we moved on to our oblique and isometric views. For the oblique, we start with a flat surface and move off at a 45 degree angle. For the isometric we start at a corner and move off at a 60 degree angle on one side and a 30 degree angle on the other.

The last view was the perspective drawing. We used horizon lines and vanishing points. This means that the further away our house gets the smaller it becomes.

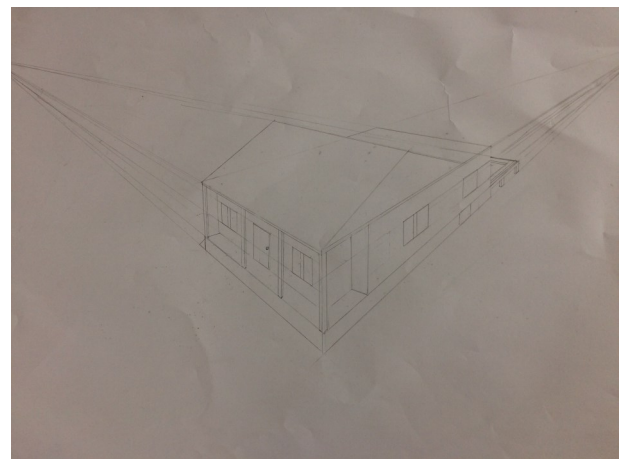
